LOCATION

Country: UK (England)

Town: Shrivenham, Watchfield

- **Entry/Exit requirements:** Blue; Green Passport, NATO Travel orders (NTO). SOFA stamp. Visa.

Other info to Consider:

- Family (non-dependants) can come to visit for up to six months on a regular Blue passport, as part of the agreement with the UK (Commonwealth).
- As of April 2019, Canadian passports are accepted to be used to exit the UK airports, through E-gates. E-gates are not accessible if traveling with minors. Stamps are no longer required.
- Defence Academy of the United Kingdom, Watchfield. Admin Assistant Tina Steward available on site for support.

POPULATION

Size: Shrivenham: over 2,200. Watchfield: 3,500, Swindon: 185,000 (closest biggest city),

Ethnicity: Mostly nationals, but has a large international community associated with the RAF base.

Religion: Mainly Christians, and churches of all denominations can be found throughout the UK, such as Catholic, Protestant, Baptist and Methodist. The main other religions are Islam, Hinduism, Sikhism, Judaism and Buddhism.

LANGUAGE(S)

Official language: English

Prevalence of French or English speaking: French as a second language sometimes.

- Very limited restaurants and shops will have some staff that speaks French.
- Some French because of the international academy population in the area. No services are offered in French

COST OF LIVING

Exchange rate to consider: Great British Pound (GBP)

QUALITY OF LIFE

Climate and potential for severe weather, natural disasters:

- Humid, temperate climate. High risk of flooding – occurs annually. An average of 164 days of sun per year, rest of the days are cloudy and rainy.

Laws and Culture:

- Drinking age is 18, minors aged 16 or 17 may consume beer, wine or cider with a meal, accompanied by a parent
- People smoke and drink more here than in Canada, including teenagers.
- Although you should carry an international driving permit, you can drive with a valid Canadian licence.
- Traffic drives on the left.
- UK has strong gun laws – most firearms may have to be left in long term storage.
- Speeding and drunk driving are dealt with severely.
- Speeding is monitored via cameras (which are everywhere) and the slightest speeding (over three miles an hour) will ensure that you receive a £100 fine

Safety and Security:

- There is a threat of terrorism in Europe. Terrorists have carried out attacks in several European cities.
- In the United Kingdom, previous incidents have resulted in casualties. They include random violent incidents in public areas, such as knife and vehicle attacks as well as explosions.
- These incidents have occurred mainly in the London area but have also happened elsewhere.

- Further attacks in Europe are also likely.

Level of isolation:

- More difficult posting for single members as there are many balls and social events on base. Since single members cannot live on the military base, it can be very isolating. Local single members do not stay in the area on weekends.
- Easy access to villages by foot.
- This is considered a remote posting to the UK.
- There are six Canadian families in this location. (Staff and students)

HOUSING

- If moving on the economy with children, location near a good rated school is essential when finding a house as school enrolment are based on catchment areas.
- On base housing is only offered to married members (Single or common-law members must find housing off base)
- On base houses are a good size for local sizes with gardens and parking with garage.
- Houses have a lot of carpet
- Housing is more difficult to find if you have pets
- Big gardens require a lot of maintenance as things grow 12 months a year

EMPLOYMENT

Are there employment opportunities for spouses? Yes.

- Spouses may work on the economy and on the military bases as civilians (NIN required)
- There are very limited employment opportunities available through CFMWS so families should plan to be single income for the duration of the posting.

Op Tempo: The op tempo will vary greatly depending on position. TD is possible.

HEALTH CARE

Access: UK healthcare system is similar to Canadian standards (public waiting times, private fast).

- All posted to the UK are entitled to the National Health System (NHS) as nationals.
- 24-hour Accident and Emergency (A&E).
- Family doctors easily accept new patients and are available near the base.
- Special consults take a very long time to get through the NHS.
- Private clinics are available and quicker in the area.
- The Canadian Medical Clinic in Geilenkirchen is responsible for the healthcare of all Canadian military members in Europe, and can be accessed.
- All bills associated with the care of dependents are the member's personal responsibility and are to be claimed through PSHCP.

Special needs:

- Resources and services are through school in association with family doctor recommendation.
- If a family member has special medical needs it is highly advised that they consult with MFS(E), and/or the Canadian Element to ensure that the required services are readily available in either English or French before accepting a posting.
- Diagnostic through schools can be a long process. Private clinics are available.

Consideration for pregnancy / birth:

- High quality health care in English. Limited to non-existent in French.
- Midwife service at home once the baby has arrived.
- Very proactive for postpartum mental welfare and support when breastfeeding.

Dental:

- Difficult to find an NHS dentist in the area.
- Private clinics are more accessible and offer the same quality of services as in Canada. You are required to pay up front, and you can then claim your expenses
- It is easy to access however; providers do not speak French.

SCHOOLING

- As per WG B decisions Sept 2018, the British curriculum is deemed non-compatible at the secondary level from grades 9 to 12 (Years 10 to 13). Students who are continuing from a British curriculum school into the secondary level, or who are able to graduate at post, may find an educational pathway within the British system. For a student to attend a British curriculum school at the secondary level, a request must be submitted to WG B for approval on an individual basis. Contact your FSD Coordinator / CEM Guidance Counsellor (CAF members only) for clarification, where applicable.

Curriculum vs. Canadian curriculum:

- Curriculum varies depending on choice of school.
- None of them offers Canadian history or geography.
- The curriculum is more advanced in the United Kingdom.
- School starts at 4 years old (A child must be 4 by September)

Resources for special need children:

- Educators in school.
- Should it be determined that a child requires special needs due to developmental or mental health concerns while posted OUTCAN, this could pose a serious risk to the posting and the family may be considered for repatriation.

CHILDCARE

Things to Consider:

- There are many preschools and nurseries in the area.
- On the military base, the Welfare center has a small crèche.
- When children turn three years. old they have access to 15 free hours (but this does not include snacks, lunches, etc.)

TRANSPORTATION

Things to Consider:

- If living off base, a vehicle is recommended to explore the area.
- When living on the military base, one vehicle is sufficient for families as most services are within walking distance.
- There is also a reliable bus service to major cities in the area.
- Train service is available in bigger cities in the area
- Free bus around town.

RESOURCES AND AMENITIES

Is there a Military Family Services centre available in that location?

- No, under MFS(E) UK, located in CFSU(E) Det London in Ruislip.

Psychosocial / Mental Health Resources:

- Not at post, MFS(E) SW for dependants only, CAF SW/Mental Health Team for member and family are located in Geilenkirchen, Germany. Padre is located in the UK.

Communications (e.g. Quality of Internet connection):

- If getting internet, you have to pay for a single phone line whether you use the phone line or not.
- In the area, the cell phone service inside the homes can be very spotty; you will need to keep your cell phone on the window ledge.
- Cellphone connection and Internet are difficult to predict. The service differs from one street to the next and is even difficult on the military bases.

ACTIVITIES

Access to sports or other leisure activities:

- On the economy, very limited in French.

Availability of playgrounds: Yes.

RESTRICTIONS TO CONSIDER

Are common law relationships recognized? Yes.

Are same sex couples recognized? Yes.

Medications that are illegal in the country:

- Cannabis is illegal.

Other Considerations:

- Banned dog breeds - American Pitbull Terrier, Dogo Argentino, Fila Brasileiro (Brazilian Mastiff), Tosa Inu
- Importation of pets is subject to rigorous controls although quarantine may no longer be necessary.
