Core services

Whether it be for education, skill-building, peer support, counselling, or referrals to outside resources, we work together with families to help them understand and cope better with any challenges of:

Relocation

Assisting families to integrate into their new community before and during their postings as well as when they leave for their new postings

Absences

Serving families experiencing work-related separation or reunion with their loved ones due to deployment or training

Transition

Helping families of new recruits, members, and veterans transition smoothly to military or civilian life

Relocation services

Helping you thrive in your new posting



In addition to in-person support, we dedicate considerable time assisting families via email and phone before their arrival, helping to ease their move. We also offer newcomer programming designed to support both new arrivals and those still settling in, fostering connections with other relocated families and the broader community. Our support continues throughout each posting, including for those preparing to move again, ensuring families feel guided

Last year, several initiatives supported newcomers and families in building connections and accessing local resources. The re-branded Family Fun Fest welcomed 40 newcomers for a day of relaxation and community bonding. The Playdate in the Park connected 59 newly-posted individuals through informal gatherings for families.

Two Info-Connect events addressed community needs—one launched a Babysitter Co-op, and the other introduced local library services. The Let's Connect CAF Community helped new members and their partners begin forming local ties.

New offerings included a Virtual Relocation Information Session attended by 22 relocating individuals and the Building Blocks Program, which used LEGO to help 14 children develop social skills.

Relocation services - Thunder Bay

For families about to move to Thunder Bay, our relocation service offers preposting packages and customised information on the Thunder Bay area.

When they arrive, visits to the MFRC are encouraged and staff reach out to families with welcome calls and emails to ensure a smooth community transition.

Our Open Doors Information Mornings were essential in building relationships with the units at the O'Kelly VC Armoury and HMCS Griffon. Families had opportunities to participate in sessions about relocation, which were crucial for the success of this area of service. New members and families who relocated to Thunder Bay received pertinent information during our regular visits and in our briefings.

Other supports and services

Lending Library

Our Lending Library provides the Winnipeg military community with day passes to various attractions in Manitoba for a minimal annual fee for the entire family.

This year, 40 families benefitted from this program that allowed them to experience the **Manitoba Museum** and **FortWhyte Alive**.

We were also able to add the **Winnipeg Art Gallery** to the selection of sites to explore this year.

Career and employment

Employment Resource Hub (CFMWS)

The site continues to be a valuable self-serve tool for families who are experiencing changes in employment due to multiple military lifestyle challenges. Through it, we share up-to-date information about job and networking opportunities, as well as tips and tools for securing employment and enhancing resumes.



Employment Workshop

We offered employment workshops over the past year, focusing on learning transferable skills, navigating online job sites, and making job applications stand out. We also covered how to secure interviews and prepare for them, all while helping participants expand their personal employment support networks.



Employment supports - Thunder Bay

YES Employment Services and **Northwest Employment Works** remain our go-to agencies for the employment needs of relocated families. They offer one-on-one help, job-readiness workshops, and self-serve resources. Families who utilise local agencies like these find it much easier to settle in their new community. Whether for youth, persons with disabilities, or newcomers, anyone can find their path to employment success in Thunder Bay.

Second Language Training

In the past year, we served 26 clients by registering them with either the <u>Language Research Development Group (LRDG)</u> or the <u>Rosetta</u> **Stone**.



For LRDG, we had 22 clients studying French and four clients taking English classes. For Rosetta Stone, Bronze Catalyst licenses were exclusively available for OUTCAN family members to learn languages other than French and English.

Child Care Centre

Nurturing like no other

Our Centre accommodates 127 spaces for children of military families and the local community, from 12 weeks to 12 years old. Our program uses an emergent curriculum to offer inclusive care and fun learning experiences for all ages, from infants to schoolaged children.

Last year, we were grateful to Kim Dunning for stepping in as our Acting Director. Under her capable leadership, we were able to introduce new activities. Our children loved our monthly music program with **Wee Be Jammin**. They were delighted to see the performances from the RCAF Band, as well as from a local Indigenous drummer and a hoop dancer. We also brought in **GymKyds** for recreational gymnastics and **Star Dome** for a chance to explore and

appreciate the night sky.

All our centre staff attended our annual Professional Development Day, which focused on effective communication. Additionally, they completed mandatory child abuse training and continued to take workshops on effective guidance techniques and decoding difficult behaviours.

Nursery School

Ensuring quality care and learning

Our Nursery School is all about creating a safe, welcoming, and enriching environment where children can learn, explore and thrive.

We offer diverse learning experiences for children three to five years old. We hold morning and afternoon classes on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. Our afternoon sessions have an introduction to French, allowing students to explore the language and culture.

Our staff members are dedicated to continuous growth and professional development to provide our children with the best possible care and education. Last year, they took part in training programs, including the Circle of Security Training. This focuses on building strong relationships with the children and supporting their emotional well-being. They also joined the Manitoba Child Care Association (MCCA) Annual Conference to further their skills and knowledge in Early Childhood Education.

We extend a huge thank you to all our families and staff for your unwavering support and commitment to our nursery school community. We could not achieve this without you!

Deployment services

A helping hand in your absence

We recognise the unique challenges faced by families during deployments due to training or courses, whether short or long-term. Our team is committed to providing consistent support at every stage—before, during, and after absences.

This year, we offered both individual and group-based services in person, virtually, or in hybrid formats to meet families where they are. Resources such as pre-deployment checklists, warm-line calls, connector events, and therapeutic workshops helped families prepare for and manage separation while connecting them to both internal and external supports.

To foster connection and resilience, we hosted a range of events, including the Family BBQ, the Reintegration Brunch, and the Holiday Deployment Dinner.

We also offered creative and mindfulness-based workshops such as the Mindful Meditation with Goats, the Being Present with Plants, and the Family Drumming.

The Canadian Forces Postal Service Workshop and the by-appointment Morale Mail Package-building Workshop helped families stay connected with loved ones.

Other by-request workshops, such as the Deployment Memory Box and the Bonding Without Borders, ensured that support was meaningful and accessible. Through it all, we remained dedicated to walking alongside families throughout their deployment journey.

Fostering resilience through change





Supports for new recruits

We connect with the families of new recruits to welcome them into the military community. It is important for us to help them feel at ease and answer basic questions they might have about their new life, military training, and what to expect.

We are excited to have them join our community and are here for the information and support they might need along the way.

Veteran Family Services

We are committed to supporting medically-released and medically-releasing veterans and their families as they transition to civilian life—a journey that can be challenging and complex.

Our focus is on making this transition smoother by helping veterans navigate available resources, access appropriate referrals, and achieve their personal goals in areas such as mental health, education, finances, physical wellness, and social connection.

Over the past year, we delivered a range of workshops designed to support wellness and build resilience. We also reintroduced two in-house therapy-based workshops aimed at promoting overall well-being. These included the Introduction to Pet Therapy, allowing participants to interact with therapy dogs as a way to manage stress. The Shadow Box Art Therapy gave participants a creative outlet to explore emotions and healing. Through these efforts, we continue to stand by our veteran clients, offering support and balance as they move forward in their new chapter.

The Mental Health First Aid course equipped our attendees to recognise and

respond to mental health challenges. Finally, we hosted the Veteran Family Virtual Summit online, which provided valuable mental health and well-being insights to the veteran community.

Services for families of members who are ill, injured, and have fallen

We welcomed Stefy Reed back from maternity leave this past year, and she has stepped into the role of Family Liaison Officer (FLO).

The families we serve often go through illness, injury, and loss-related grief. It can be tough for our clients as they navigate the release process, adjust to new roles and realities following health challenges, change identities, and adapt to life outside of the CAF, all while striving to maintain a sense of belonging.

Our main services include counselling, mental health support, and parenting resources. Additionally, we proactively connect families with outside resources and provide crisis counselling in times of distress. We work closely with the 17 Wing's Designated Assistants and Padres to ensure our clients get the support they need when it is most critical.

Our FLO also shares her expertise with the Transition Centre (TC) staff. On top of this,

Mental health supports

Enhancing your well-being

"You have been consistently patient and understanding. You strike a perfect balance between validating my experience and challenging me to grow. As someone living with BPD, ADHD, and PTSD, I've learned practical skills to calm my mind and regulate my emotions, which has improved both my relationships and my daily life." – a military spouse

Our Social Worker (SW) assisted clients facing marital stress, parenting challenges, and the emotional difficulties that arise from postings, deployments, and various adjustments with life in the CAF.

We offer mental health and psychosocial support for military members and their families as they go through these challenges as a child, spouse, parent, or single individual. We use a holistic approach, believing that everyone in the family has a role in each other's mental health and well-being, which is essential for service success.

Lifestyle changes can put a strain on relationships. We provide Couples Therapy to address this. It is a safe and supportive space to rebuild



communication, work through conflicts, and reconnect emotionally.

Changes in environments can impact children's emotional well-being. This is where Play Therapy comes in. It gives children a chance to express their feelings freely and process what is happening at home.

Another essential support is our parenting program. We help caregivers in single and dual-parent households strengthen their bonds with their children and better understand their emotional needs.

When needed, we connect families to external resources to ensure comprehensive support. And in emergencies, we work with base partners on immediate safety and stabilisation while long-term plans are arranged.

Our SW also serves on the 17 Wing's HP Committee. Being part of this diverse group of professionals on base enhances care coordination and keeps us informed on community needs. This way, we can ensure families feel supported from all sides.

"The consistent, reliable support provided to our teenager has enabled them to be comfortable to say what is going on with the knowledge they won't be judged. Positive Program

Twenty-five families took part in the program, where we tackled mental health, relocation, and deployment challenges. Participants learned tools and tips and engaged in peer-to-peer discussions. These offered valuable support for coping with the struggles they faced.

Strategic initiatives

Gender-based Violence (GBV)

Aside from recognising and supporting national and local awareness campaigns against GBV, we worked together with the 17 Wing's HP Committee to organise the following learning events:

Discussing the Impact of GBV – in this event organised in collaboration with the 17 Wing's Defence Women's Advisory Organisation (DWAO), Dr. David Delay from the University of Manitoba highlighted the effects of GBV and presented recent research that informs treatment and attitudes toward it

Incorporating Sound and Music into Selfcare Workshop – this two-part workshop allowed participants to explore the transformative potential of sound and music therapy in self-care



Lateral Violence Training – attendees learned about lateral violence and kindness, conflict interaction styles as well as how to prevent lateral violence

Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging (DEIB)

We also recognised and supported both national and local campaigns and ensured that DEIB are integrated into our daily operations. This year, we continued our participation in the 17 Wing Health Promotion's Positive Space Program, ensuring that we provide a welcoming and safe environment for everyone who engages with us.
