
Lastly, I recognize the unwavering commitment to our military community of our stakeholders and donors, without whom our success would not have been possible.

Getting you started in a new community

An intake meeting with our Client Care Coordinator (CCC) is a crucial first step in helping families settle into and find a sense of well-being in their new community.

It is a quick needs assessment meeting to get to know the member and their family's specific needs and connect them to the appropriate resources and supports.

Apart from meeting 165 families last fiscal year, we implemented events that brought together newly-arrived families to meet other relocated families, establish connections, and learn about community events and resources.

Throughout the year, we have not only developed programs that inform the families of our service offerings but also invited local and national organizations to share information on essential topics. These included homeschooling, tutoring, healthcare, mental health, and various places and things to enjoy in their new community.

Families had opportunities to participate in sessions about relocation, which were crucial for the success of this area of service. New members who relocated to Thunder Bay received important information during our regular visits and MFRC briefings.

Career and employment

Employment Workshop

Held in September 2023, this workshop focused on learning transferable skills, identifying those skills, and incorporating them into resumes, interviews, and the workplace.

Second Language



Over the past year, we had 34 clients who reached out to us for second language classes. We directed them to register with either **Rosetta Stone** or **Language Research Development Group (LRDG)**.

Our clients utilized our 18 Rosetta Stone licenses to learn Spanish, German, Japanese, English, and French.
Meanwhile, those who registered with LRDG were learning English and French.

Without an in-house French teacher, we proactively directed four French learners to join the online classes

offered by Edmonton and Ottawa MFRCs. We appreciate your support in accommodating our clients!

The community's interest in learning French remains strong, with 80% of the 23 French learners expressing a preference for in-person classes.

This demand has prompted us to expand our inaugural community conversation in English into French, with the support of two French-speaking volunteers who have committed to leading it.

Child Care Centre

Offering inclusive and enriching experiences

We provide full-time care to children ages 12 weeks to 12 years old. Our programs offer inclusive and enriching experiences for infants, toddlers, preschoolers, and school-age children.

Our children not only learn through our emergent curriculum but also have access to various indoor and outdoor spaces, play equipment, and toys. They participate in playtime, special events, and unique experiences as well.

Last year, our children enjoyed a diverse range of experiences, including a circus performance, family BBQ/picnic and petting zoo in June 2023, and hands-on gardening activities. Additionally, they had the opportunity to witness a spectacular performance by the RCAF band.

We are grateful for the support of the Canada – Manitoba Canada-Wide Early Learning and Child Care Agreement's Quality Assurance Grants. This grant will allow us to improve our outdoor play space and expand our garden areas. This support is vital in ensuring that we continue to provide the best possible childcare services.



Nursery School

A learning, caring, and playing space

Our nursery school offers morning and afternoon classes on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. The afternoon session includes an introduction to French.

In the past year, we had our regular programming, with the Wee Be Jammin music classes held all year round.

In addition, we had our first open house in March 2024. Eight families joined us for a meet-and-greet with our staff, a tour of our facilities, crafts, and snacks.

Deployment services

Strengthening connections

We offer individualized and groupbased support to members and their families who are dealing with the challenges of absences or separations due to deployment or training.

Our approach includes predeployment meetings and warm-line calls that we make after initial deployment and during the reintegration phase, demonstrating our commitment to understanding needs and providing support.

In addition, we organize Deployment Dinners and conduct Morale Mail Package-building Workshops to encourage families to celebrate resilience during deployment and strengthen connections during separation. Last year, we were proud to host three of each event.

We also accessed emergency funding for families experiencing distress and food insecurity.

Since Tamika Reid joined our team in May 2023, we have introduced new ways to engage our clients. Our main goal remains to bring families together for support and learning through shared experiences to alleviate the stress related to the different stages of deployment.


New deployment programs implemented

Transition services

Building courage through change

Navy Experience Program

Services for members who are ill and injured, and the bereaved

Our Family Liaison Officer (FLO) provides counselling and referrals to members and their families dealing with injury, illness, and death.

In October 2023, our FLO visited MFRC Thunder Bay to extend our services to our clients there.

The FLO is also a wealth of resources for the Transition Centre (TC) staff and 17 Wing Winnipeg service providers.



We also assist the Designated Assistants (DA) in crisis situations and provide support to families experiencing grief. In March 2024, the FLO shared professional insights at a three-day learning course for DAs.

To promote our services within the 17 Wing community, the FLO participates in the Helping Professionals (HP) Showcase. Additionally, the FLO represents us on the HP Committee, which is responsible for developing and executing Gender-Based Violence (GBV) programs on 17 Wing.

Veteran Family Services

Our services are tailored for members, veterans, and their families adapting to post-military life.

In the past year, we assisted 37 clients with resource navigation and referrals and helped them achieve their social, physical, financial, educational, and mental health goals.

We delivered holistic, therapy-based workshops aimed at enhancing their overall well-being.

Additionally, we participated in national programming such as the Mental Health First-Aid Course, which we offered to the veteran community in September 2023 and March 2024. The course taught participants how to identify emerging mental health problems and respond effectively to mental health crises.

Our clients also had the opportunity to attend the two-day veteran family virtual summit hosted by the **Atlas Institute for Veterans and Families** in January 2024. This summit focused on family mental health and well-being.


In-house workshops delivered

Mental health supports

Making you healthier and happier

In August 2023, we were fortunate to welcome Samanta Dubois to our team as our term Child and Family Social Worker. Her office is mainly responsible for offering short-term counselling and referrals around mental health and other psychosocial concerns.

We had the privilege of supporting children, teenagers, adults, single individuals, couples, and families in the unique and often challenging aspects of the military lifestyle, such as frequent relocations, absences, and difficult transitions.

We also assisted them through relationship matters and provided help in times of anxiety. depression, and traumatic events.

Most of our clients were children who sought our services for a variety of reasons, including attachment issues, gender identity, and suicidal ideation.

Many families also sought parenting support, and one family accessed emergency assistance.

With a high demand for parenting support, we developed a parenting program in response to this need. We were proud to deliver ten sessions under this program last year.

This program is based on child-parent relationship therapy and draws on the principles of child-centred play therapy. The overall aim is to enhance and strengthen relationships by improving family interactions and problem-solving strategies and reinforcing feelings of affection, warmth, and trust within the family.

Our Social Worker also represents us on the Helping Professionals Committee. Together with our Program Manager, Jenny Brennan, we were grateful for all of Samanta's hard work in putting together the MFRC International Women's Day event in March 2024, which was supported by GBV funds.

Positive Program

We offer this program to promote positivity and provide strategies for maintaining a positive outlook while facing military lifestyle challenges.

Last year, we focused on mental health, relocation, and deployment, with over 25 family members in attendance. The tools and tips and the invaluable peer-to-peer discussions helped attendees cope with their lifestyle struggles.

Mental health supports - Thunder Bay

We continue to provide support to families through the <u>Family Information Line</u>, <u>Canadian Forces Member Assistance Program</u>, Personnel Support Program, Health Promotion, and our core services staff and social workers. These subject matter experts enhance our services, which are designed to provide mental health support.

Strategic initiatives

Gender-based Violence (GBV)

We strive to become an agent for raising awareness about GBV and its impacts. Last year, our focus was on continuous learning and engaging with the community.

All of our staff completed the Genderbased Analysis+ course by the Department for Women and Gender Equality.

Through the Helping Professionals
Committee, we were able to organize the
Restorative Justice Training for 17 Wing
personnel and our staff in August 2023. This
workshop, provided by the <u>Crisis and</u>
<u>Trauma Resource Institute (CTRI)</u>, offered
insights on integrating restorative justice
principles when addressing harmful
situations

Apart from organizing and attending GBV training, we also take part in 17 Wing-initiated events addressing GBV. These included the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-based Violence observed in November 2023, where we displayed a purple ribbon during the ribbon ceremony to symbolize our commitment to raising awareness and helping end GBV.
